What's Cooking in 2009?

It's been a busy break. December 2008 was filled with family visits. Lots of festivities and food, laughing, talking, outings...and washing.

The house emptied out early in the new year. Then it was time to cope with the sudden echoing quiet by getting on with the annual cull of books and belongings, weeding and feeding the garden, and turning the kitchen upside down and inside out. And time at last to read one of my Christmas presents: *Animal, Vegetable, Miracle* by Barbara Kingsolver.

I had hinted that I wanted this book, as I admire the author's novels. They include *The Poisonwood Bible*, a strong, uncomfortable account of a missionary family in Africa; and *Prodigal Summer*, a celebration of fruitfulness. I find her latest book so challenging and rewarding that I want to share it.

It is not another foodie book, not another self-sufficiency story, not another account of a 'Year in...'. It is the story of an American family who set out to find themselves a real culture of

food. They define a genuine food culture as an affinity between people and the land that feeds them.

Barbara and her husband Steven (a biology professor) were concerned about the how modern food production, distribution and consumption is affecting the health and well-being of Americans and the planet earth.

Together with their two daughters they made a commitment to a year of eating locally, mostly from their own garden, the way NZers did a few decades ago. Barbara's chronicle of the year is accompanied by comments from Steven on political, scientific and sociological concerns and daughter Camille offers recipes and reflections.

It was a year of balance, with a holiday fitted in; a year of learning, responding, caring, and working. It was not a straightforward or easy time but it was productive and nourishing. It's the kind of year we could be considering in our parishes as we meet to plan the months ahead.

The focus of the book is on relationships: food and people, people and the land, families, communities and nations.

Our Methodist year begins with a focus on relationships too, as we reaffirm in the Covenant Service the relationship between God the sustaining Creator and us, God's people. The Scriptures tell the story of that relationship


expressed in God's covenants with the Children of Israel and the New Covenant of Jesus.

Our task for the year is to faithfully honour these covenants - season by season, month by month



Poetry with Robin List: February's Poet: R.A.K. Mason

10 January 1905 – 13 July 1971



(Ronald Allison Kells, in case you were wondering)

There's this quote from Allen Curnow, and he may have grown sorry he wrote it because it's so well thrashed, that Ron Mason was this country's "first wholly original, unmistakably gifted poet". Which was good of Curnow, because he set out in roughly the same era and he was no slouch as a poet himself. Mason was definitely ahead of

Fairburn for my liking, though they were friends and Mason wrote his friend's biography.

He achieved success early, writing in a spare style that communicates clearly, helped by his strong grasp of grammar and a call to Christian life in action. There is a story set in the late 1920s, recorded for us by Rachel Barrowman, that in disgust or despair (or both?) Mason threw 200 copies of his first book 'The Beggar' into Auckland harbour. NZ society was just too provincial and puritanical to read its own poetry. This may be another type of story; myth.

Other events were in play to shape Ron Mason's views and work. With the coming of the Great Depression and World War II his output changed to mainly journalism and plays with a strongly left wing stance.

'On the Swag', written in the early 1930s, is his most famous poem today. It has been set to music three times, including Colin Gibson amongst the composers. It sits perhaps in the transition time of Mason's life and work.

On the Swag

His body doubled
under the pack
that sprawls untidily
on his old back,
the cold wet dead-beat
plods up the track.

The cook peers out:
oh, curse that old lag —
here again
with his clumsy swag
made of a dirty old
turnip-bag.

Bring him in, cook,
from the cold level sleet:
put silk on his body,
slippers on his feet;
give him fire
and bread and meat.


Let the fruit be plucked
and the cake be iced,
the bed be snug
and the wine be spiced
for the old cove's night-cap —
for this is Christ.

Symbolism of the Passion Flower

The naming of the passion flower dates back to 1620 when Mexican Augustinian friar, Emmanuel de Villegas, came across a beautiful plant in Peru.

That night, he said he experienced a vision in his sleep that revealed the symbolism of this beautiful plant representing the suffering of Jesus Christ during his crucifixion, which is referred to as the "Passion of Christ." In his vision, the various parts of the plant could be used to help teach about the Passion, providing a visual means of teaching the Gospel story in an era where there were no printed catechisms.



- the five petals and five sepals taken together represent the ten faithful apostles (excluding St Peter the denier and Judas the betrayer)
- the flower's radial filaments or corona represent the crown of thorns

- the three stigmas represent the three nails; and the five anthers represent the five wounds (four by nails and one by the lance)
- the tendrils represent the whips used in the flagellation of Christ
- the almost perfectly spherical fruit represent the world that Jesus saved



Our passionfruit vine in the Community garden currently has a good crop of unripe fruits which are still green and smooth. They will be ready to eat when they have turned dark purple, wrinkly, and soft.

Evan Ireland of our Waikanae Congregation has come up with this checklist for you to refer to when you receive phone calls, emails, text or whatsapp messages:

STOP if you are asked to:

- **Buy gift cards or vouchers**
(Apple, Google Play, Steam, supermarket cards) and send the codes.
- **Send money in unusual ways**
Wire transfers, cryptocurrency, prepaid cards, cash in the mail.
- **Move your money “to keep it safe”**
Transfer funds to a so-called safe, holding, or secure account.
- **Share security information**
Passwords, PINs, one-time codes, recovery phrases, or ID photos.
- **Click unsolicited links or open unsolicited attachments**
Especially for “account problems,” invoices, or deliveries you weren’t expecting.
- **Allow remote access to your device**
Installing software so someone can “fix” your computer or phone.
- **Pay a fee to receive money**
Taxes, processing fees, release charges, or verification payments.
- **Confirm personal details urgently**
Date of birth, address, bank details, or login information.
- **Keep the transaction secret**
Being told not to talk to family, bank staff, or church members.
- **Act immediately without checking**
Being rushed before you can seek advice or pray.

These requests are scams.

You should ignore and delete the messages - never reply to them
