Hope, Peace, Joy & Love

During the four weeks of Advent as we lead up to the celebration of the birth of Jesus, who was born in less-than-ideal circumstances, I encourage you to take a moment to reflect on children living in poverty in Aotearoa New Zealand today.

The MSD Child Poverty Report 2022 released earlier this year reported that 11% of our children are living in material hardship - that is about 130,000 children in households that are regularly going without basic items. Material hardship means being unable to afford six or more essential items such as having enough food to eat, warm clothes, and sturdy shoes.

The data showed that it is children that live in beneficiary households, as well as Māori and Pacific children that are most likely to live in material hardship. If you are a child living in a sole parent household, you are three to four times more likely to be living in material hardship, than if you were a child living with two parents. And if you are a child living in a household that relies on a benefit for income, you are four to five times more likely to be living in material hardship that those in working households.

130,000 children living in material hardship is not something to celebrate, it should be an impetus for immediate action. It is hard to visualise what 130,000 children living in material hardship looks like, so try this. Take the combined population of everyone living in Palmerston North, and everyone living in Nelson, that totals about 130,000. Now, imagine they are all children, and sprinkle them throughout the motu - there are our 130,000 children living in material hardship.

In addition, the data shows that work is not the best way out of poverty, as for many households full-time employment does not provide enough income for the household. This is true even when tax credits are applied. Approximately half the children living in material hardship come from households where parents are working.

This is due to the rising costs of housing with many households spending more than half their income on accommodation. This combined with the rising cost of living has impacted those on lower incomes more severely.

The 11% of our children living in material hardship is still above the Government interim target to reduce child poverty to 10.5% by 2020/2021. The Government's long term target to reduce child poverty is 5% by 2027/2028.

This is not something that Government can do on its own. Everyone in Aotearoa needs to commit to ensure that our tamariki are not living in material hardship and deprivation. This shared responsibility means that we all need to be prepared to change to make the lives of tamariki that live in Aotearoa better. A revised tax system that ensures a fairer future for everyone and income security for our most vulnerable may affect those who are better off.

It is time to actively encourage Government to fully implement all the recommendations of the Expert Welfare Advisory Group. This report was released in February 2019 and while there has been some progress, not all the recommendations have been implemented.

It is time to actively encourage Government to find new ways to distribute wealth more equitably via the tax system.

It is time that we had a fairer future for everyone. ActionStation's Fairer Future campaign has a petition to encourage Government to take seven steps toward a fairer future. The seven steps are:

- 1. Increase core benefit levels to the standard of liveable incomes
- 2. Raise the minimum wage to the living wage
- 3. Increase the Disability Allowance
- 4. Overhaul relationship rules
- 5. Remove sanctions
- 6. Wipe debt owed to the Ministry of Social Development
- 7. Improve supplementary assistance and urgent grants

These seven steps are a circuit breaker for people and whānau whose lives have been most disrupted by the cost of living crisis and the pandemic. You can read the full petition and sign it here - https://our.actionstation.org.nz/petitions/take-seven-steps-toward-a-fairer-future-for-all-of-us-1

Members of the Methodist Alliance's working group campaigning to increase benefit levels and abatement rates has been part the Fairer Future campaign. Our working group created a video for MCNZ Conference 2022 which highlighted the underlying issues relating to income security, and featured people with lived experience of life on a benefit and the struggle to make ends meet. We thank them for their courage, honesty and generosity in sharing their stories with us.

We also acknowledge and appreciate the rich and valuable feedback we received from Synods, Parishes and individuals on our discussion paper about wealth distribution and income security. This input helped us shape and refine the report presented to Conference.

We are grateful that Conference agreed to our suggested decisions relating to this and the working group will be crafting resources for parishes to use to facilitate robust discussions within the Connexion and with local political candidates and key Government Ministers.

We live in hope that we can effect change, so that we can create a just and inclusive society where everyone can flourish.

May God bless us with anger at injustice, oppression, and exploitation of people, so that we work for justice, freedom and peace.

May God bless us with the joy of gratitude, so we recognise the small things that make life good.

May God bless us with the generosity of love, so we can truly understand how we are connected with each other.

Do you hear what I hear?

Advent is a time of preparation. A time to focus, with repentance, fasting, and prayer on preparing for Epiphany – remembering the Magi's visit to the baby Jesus and a celebration of Jesus' incarnation on Earth.

Do you see what I see?

The Latin term adventus means "arrival" or "coming," particularly the coming of something having great importance.

The focus of the Methodist Mission Southern's work prepares our clients for the coming of something that will greatly impact their lives. A better future. By providing support with our broad range of evidence-based services, we provide support for the aspirations of those who have suffered struggles, some inevitable, many regrettable, and in doing so we are giving hope for a positive future. Change That Works: enough support and challenge for you to risk a better future.

We listen to the same words of Christmas carols year after year, but do we have the same understanding? Are we really listening?

A recent attendee of the Mission's Parenting Through Separation course commented on "how valuable the course had been to her in understanding where her former partner was in the separation process. She had initiated the separation and had already gone through a lot of the emotional process. She was looking for them to be able to communicate freely and couldn't understand why he was being, in her opinion, "difficult". The course gave her a much better understanding that for the one left behind this does not come as quickly and each person has their own process to travel."

Do you hear what I hear?

Christmas carols, of course, tell the story of the Nativity and the birth of Jesus Christ, the words of the hymn O-Come, O-Come Emmanuel originally sung in Latin, with roots in the 8th/9th Centuries, translated in 1861, and is based on Matthew 1:23. We sing "Make safe the way that leads on high, And close the path to misery". One of our youth transition house residents reflected "I had got into some pretty bad situations when away (from the house) and didn't realise how well I had been cared for while at the house."

Do you know what I know?

We Three Kings was written by Rev. John Henry Hopkins Jnr in 1857 and the words seem as relevant today as in the time they were written. We are still a society that is striving to support people to live the life Jesus intended for us. "Still proceeding, Guide us to thy perfect light."

The Mission's work encompasses that guiding towards a better future with our early childhood services, self-regulation, and oral language programmes, youth transition housing, Young Mums' housing, client support services, sustaining tenancies, parenting programmes, driver licence training, and capability building initiatives for other social service providers.

"Till he appeared and the soul felt its worth." are rich and meaningful words to Adolphe Adam's (1803–1856) O Holy Night. Kenneth Kovacs writes "Jesus' birth demonstrates definitively for the world that the soul has found its worth, that with his birth the soul felt, knew, acknowledged, accepted its worth, its value."

The value and worth of Methodist Mission Southern's programmes to individual, family and whanau within the community are heard in the 'stories' we share each month through our newsletters. We support and alleviate some of the well-known pressures currently faced in New Zealand with housing affordability, homelessness, social isolation, mental health and well-being, material hardship, family violence, sexual health issues, addiction issues, and the ongoing effects of COVID mean that many whānau are struggling to lead healthy, fulfilling dignified lives. Our vision is of a safe, caring, and sustainable society where every citizen is valued and respected, and enjoys an equal opportunity to lead a fulfilled life.

Kenneth Kovacs reiterates that each and every one of us is valued and respected. "When we sing Joy to the World, we are to remember that we are the joy of God's world. We all matter. The birth of Jesus means that being born, being human, matters, has value, is of inestimable worth. Humanity matters. — God's glory is known. It seems to me that this is integral to what we celebrate at Christmas."

A young mum struggling without whanau support is resident in our Waihopai Young Mums' House. "nervous and anxious young 19-year-old YM who has 8-month-old twin boys.. wanting to continue with education but found herself in a situation where it seemed impossible. She is now thriving as are her boys! We have her connected to the young parents' program at MYPLC Surry Park where she will continue with her Level 3 qualifications. We are just 2 weeks in but we are on the way to helping the YM become the best mum aspires to be."

Do you hear what I hear? Is a relatively modern carol, based loosely on the Nativity as told in the Gospel of Matthew, however, it was written in response to the Cuban Missile Crisis of 1962. It is a message of peace.

Which hymns will you (really) hear this Christmas? What words will catch your attention and focus? May you hear meaning in the words of the carols/hymns you sing this Advent, and may they lead you in preparation, and hope for not only ourselves but for hope, growth, and change in those who are lost, those who are last, and those who are the least.

"For all the promises of God find their Yes in him. That is why it is through him that we utter our Amen to God for his glory" (2 Corinthians 1:20)



West Papua Independence Day

Calls for support of West Papuan, and boycott of Indonesian products

01 December marks West Papua Independence Day, this year marked sixty-one years since the West Papuans first raised their flag, the Morning Star, as the symbol of their forthcoming independence from Dutch colonial rule. In previous years, the Indonesian military and police have responded with increased violent oppression around this day, arresting and killing those

they perceive as pro-independence activists. West Papua Independence Day was marked by solidarity events around the world, including in Aotearoa New Zealand.

At the World Council of Churches 11th Assembly in September 2022, a minute was recorded. This Minute expressed the grave concern of the international ecumenical fellowship regarding the situation in Tanah Papua, the West Papuan provinces of Indonesia. The Indigenous Papuan people (the vast majority of whom are Christians) continue to suffer serious and systemic violations of their physical security and human rights, including arbitrary arrests, torture and extrajudicial killings as well as sexual and gender-based violence, while independent journalists, international humanitarian organizations and human rights monitors are allowed at best restricted or no access to the territory.

The World Council of Churches urges all member churches and partners to increase their awareness, accompaniment and support for the people and churches of Tanah Papua in the midst of this longstanding and worsening crisis.

Marking the 2022 Indipendence Day, the Pacific Council of Churches has launched a call for a boycott of all Indonesian products and programmes by the Indonesian Government until Indonesia facilitates a visit by the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (UNHCHR) to investigate reported human rights abuses – including torture, extrajudicial killings, and systemic police and military violence. The call for boycott was endorsed by the PCC Executive Committee last month, in response to information of a similar call at the Methodist Church in Fiji's Annual Conference in August this year.

"We recall that when God sent Moses to Pharaoh to call for the end of oppression and slavery of the Israelites and Pharaoh refused to listen, God sanctioned Egypt ecologically. In echoing the cry for social, cultural, political, economic and ecological justice by our West Papuan sisters and brothers and in response to the call for solidarity and support from the West Papua Council of Churches, this call for the boycott of Indonesian products and Indonesian Government programmes (economic, cultural, etc) is being launched today."

Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel:

Commemorating 20 years.

The World Council of Churches' Ecumenical Accompaniment Programme in Palestine and Israel (WCC-EAPPI) was created in 2002 by the World Council of Churches based on an appeal from local church leaders to create an international presence in the country. WCC member churches have since engaged over 1,800 Ecumenical Accompaniers from 25 countries to

serve 3-month terms in placements around the West Bank.

Working closely with local communities, Israeli and Palestinian human rights groups, and international agencies, the programme has maintained a constant presence in the region ever since.

Ecumenical Accompaniers from all age groups aim to offer a protective presence to vulnerable communities, monitoring and reporting human rights abuses. They join Palestinians and Israelis who work in nonviolent ways for peace, by simply being a presence that makes the costs of human rights abuses more apparent to the perpetrators, persuades them to act differently, and deters attacks on civilians. Often, simply being a visible presence at security check-points, or accompanying children to schools, can make all the difference to fostering peace. Read more here...

However, the COVID-19 pandemic added to the uncertainty of organising the Assembly as per the original schedule, and subsequently, it was twice decided to postpone it till the situation became conducive.
