Waikanae News

The fair has been cancelled due to Covid; meanwhile, Sharon Marsden is selling, on the internet, goods for the Waikanae stalls that have been collected to date. This has already raised in excess of \$500 and is ongoing. Thanks Sharon!

Church interior painting will commence soon on a DIY basis, using hired scaffolding as needed. We are considering a “one colour” scheme, as used at Paekakariki, and will do the entrance foyer this way first to see how it works out. There is no existing matching paint, so we have a free hand in selecting a new colour. Covid will play its usual role in dictating timing of the work.

The rear yard fence needs replacement; this might possibly be funded by MOE grant as it is required for playgroup. It would be another DIY project. We are considering adding a gate, and moving the fence out further to increase the yard size.

Playgroup (Waikanae) is in need of a regular helper/s to set up/put away things on Friday mornings; anyone who would like to offer to help every Friday, or go on a roster to help occasional Fridays, please contact Marie Smith 04 905 7229 or email donmariesmith18@gmail.com.

In the near future we need a mowing contractor; efforts to find one have to date been unsuccessful, and we have only a temporary arrangement with Desmond Corrigan. Thanks Desmond for all your hard work with this and the gardening! Any suggestions for a mowing contractor would be appreciated.

On 21 November it will be a 110 year celebration service of the building of the Waikanae church (it has been on the present site for about 60 years); mark your calendar! This may involve cake! Some of our members are currently creating a special celebration service. It's a milestone worth making a fuss about

Nearly 80 years after she joined Police, trailblazer Marie Storey has celebrated her 100th birthday.

Last week, Marie – one of the stars of Police’s 2016 celebrations of the 75th anniversary of women in Police – was guest of honour at a lunch of her fellow members

of Wellington Retired Police Members Club at the Royal New Zealand Police College (RNZPC).

She was presented with a bouquet by Recruit Katie Lyttle, of Wing 348 - the youngest female recruit currently at the RNZPC - on her own 21st birthday.

Marie was inspired to join Police when her police officer father came home one day in August 1941 and told her he had seen history being made with the swearing-in of the first intake of women.

She was one of 14 women who entered training in 1943 in the third intake. She was posted to Wellington Central, where she was attached to the detective branch.

Her career lasted only a few years as she had to leave to marry, as was the requirement in those days.

Deputy Commissioner Tania Kura presented Marie with a corsage and paid tribute to the pioneering women who did so much to forge policing as a worthwhile career for later generations joining – such as her own in 1987 and Katie’s in 2021.

“The changes across policing in that time have been significant,” she said. “The shame for you is that you had to leave to marry – I still had to leave to ask permission to marry in 1990...”

“For me I have to say a whole load of thank-yous... for someone like me to be able to achieve, we needed you here to pave the way for us.”



Marie was accompanied at the lunch by her grandson-in-law Tony Musha and friend and neighbour Constable Jan Leathem.

She admitted she had woken up concerned in case no-one showed up. She needn't have worried – the event was at its COVID-19 Alert Level 2 capacity of 50, with

the aroha in the room as real a presence as the magnificent cake.

Club President JJ Taylor said it was a great turnout, and significant to see tributes paid by generations of Police represented by our highest-serving female constabulary member and the youngest female recruit on-site.

“Marie certainly understood the significance of New Zealand Police honouring her in this way,” he says.

He says although her Police career was short, it was a highlight for her – and former members of Police are always regarded as such, no matter what other occupations they have held.

“Marie is a wonderful woman - bright, alert and still very independent.

“She has been a keen committed member of the Wellington Retired Police Members Club for many years. She was granted life membership in recognition of her work for the club.

“When she speaks, members listen. We wish her many happy returns.”



Pastoral email

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

I have been advised of the death of Rev. William (Bill) Francis.

Bill was born in November 1929 and after leaving school attended Christchurch Teachers' College, gaining a Diploma in Teaching in 1954.

He then attended both Canterbury University and Victoria University part time and graduated with a BA.

Bill spent three years teaching at Johnsonville Primary School before entering the Theological Hall in 1956 – the same year he and Mary married.



He was ordained Missionary for the New Hebrides at St Paul's Church Christchurch on 17 December 1958.

Bill undertook mechanical training until he left for the New Hebrides (now Vanuatu) on 5 March 1959.

He served at Onesua High School as the 1st Assistant 1959; and the following year as Headmaster.

During his time in Onesua, Bill was, at various times, a member of different Assembly Committees in Vanuatu and in 1967 was elected to be Moderator of the General Assembly [of the Presbyterian Church of the New Hebrides], which was held at Onesua.

In the community, he was an active member of the Vila Cricket Club, promoted athletics and, along with others, was instrumental in setting up the New Hebrides Amateur Athletic Association. He was privileged to be manager of the athletic team to the South Pacific Games in Noumea in 1966.

(In 1998 he was awarded the Vanuatu Medal of Merit for his services to Vanuatu.)
The family returned to New Zealand in March 1968.

Bill was on the staff of Manawatu College, Foxton, from 1968-1970 before he took up a teaching position at Niue College in 1970, and then as Headmaster from 1971.

In 1972 Bill was called to Ellerslie - Mt Wellington Parish, Auckland Presbytery on 22 February 1973 and served there until he accepted a call to West Dunedin Union Parish, Wakari, Dunedin Presbytery in February 1979 until he resigned on 31 January 1984

He and Mary then returned to Vanuatau to the Tangoa Bible College, Vanuatu 1984 to 1985 (Acting Principal 1984) before serving as the Minister of the English-speaking Congregational Christian Church of Western Samoa, Apia 1986 to 1987.

On their return, Bill undertook stated supply at Balmoral Church Auckland Presbytery before being inducted as minister in October 1988 until his retirement. He was granted the status of Minister Emeritus by Auckland Presbytery on 6 July 1992.

Bill and Mary moved to Raumati in 2008.

We give thanks for Bill's life and ministry and prayer for Mary and the family.

This is the Parish house which is rented while there is no permanent minister in the Parish.

Unfortunately a valve in the shower in the bathroom was leaking for a while before the damp floor and wall was discovered. A bookcase in the lounge was against the wall so the damage was not readily noticed. The insurance assessor has viewed the damage and we are waiting for a quote from a builder. Walls and flooring will need to be replaced and also the shower cubicle.

It has been indicated that the insurance policy may not cover all the repairs. The excess is \$1,000. Part of the carpet had to be removed so the whole room will need to be recarpeted.

St James Church, Paekakariki

The last day that the members of the Kapiti Uniting Parish who live in Paekakariki were able to use the St. James Church building was on Sunday 24 October 2021. Our thoughts and prayers are with them especially at this time of change.

Here is a short history of St. James:

1918 – Mrs Bond donated 16 perches of land to build a church at 35 Ocean Road Paekakariki. Construction started within three days of the trust meeting.

1919 - The church 30 feet x 20 feet was completed. Over the ensuing years many families have been involved in the life of the church and its various activities. Part of the Otaki Methodist Circuit.

1929 - The Sunday School had 31 scholars and the Church 13 members.

1930 - A combined village Bible class was started on Friday evenings.

1958 - 40th Church Anniversary: new church furniture dedicated, carpet laid and the church painted inside and out.

1959 – The Church leaves Paraparaumu Circuit and joins Porirua Methodist Circuit.

1961 - Was given the name St. James Methodist Church.



1966 - Addition of the church hall.

1975 - Front porch was added.

1977 - Porirua Circuit subdivided, Plimmerton-Paekakariki circuit formed.

1993 - 75 years celebrated with Sunday service, a dinner and fun and games evening in St. Peter's Hall.

1996 - St. James Church Paekakariki joined the Kapiti Uniting Parish.

2015 - An extensive maintenance project undertaken with voluntary time, skills, resources and donations.

2018 - St. James Church Paekakariki celebrated 100 years in the community.

2020 - The Kapiti Uniting Parish AGM confirmed the decision to close St. James Church, Paekakariki and that the building be sold.

We give thanks for the many people who have dedicated their lives to the work of the church in the community over all these years. Many people have been touched by this outreach into the community in so many ways. This now marks the end of an era but new ways will open up for the Kapiti Uniting Parish and the Paekakariki members.

Waikanae Women's Fellowship

Yolande from the KCDC gave a very interesting talk on recycling at the Waikanae Women's Fellowship in October.

Currently refuse from the Kapiti Coast goes to the large landfill at Marton. Recycling goes to Seaview to be sorted. ALL items must be clean for them to be recycled.

Soft plastic bags including bread bags, frozen food bags, toilet paper packaging, confectionery and biscuit wrap, chip bags, pasta and rice bags, courier envelopes, sanitary hygiene packaging, squeeze pouches, dry pet food bags, lightly foiled coffee and tea bags, garden and compost bags and basically anything made of soft plastic which can be scrunched into a ball can be placed into the marked bins at Countdown Paraparaumu and New World Waikanae and Kapiti. Visit <https://www.recycling.kiwi.nz/> for more information.

Corn-starch bags are methane producing when buried in landfill – put them in the compost heap. Use plastic bags to line rubbish bins. Do not flatten cans or plastic containers.

Batteries, fluorescent bulbs/eco bulbs go to the free drop-off at Otaihangā Transfer station.

At the Waikanae Church we are starting to collect: bread bag tags, milk bottle tops, used small batteries, metal tags from cans and wine bottle tops.

There is a shop called Ekko on the Main Road in Otaki who take these items.

Read the recycling label on items before you purchase, and choose the one which can be recycled.

A new kerbside recycling information sheet is available from the Kapiti Coast District Council.

Kia ora and warm greetings

This week we have a massive push for vaccination with the Government initiative:

[Super Saturday: Get vaccinated | Unite against COVID-19](#)

Where does the PCANZ stand on this? While we have no official policy the biblical text has plenty that can help us in our decision making.

Firstly, there is the central tenant of love for neighbour. In this case, our thinking needs to be very focused on what will help keep our neighbours safe.

Secondly, there is the biblical call to respect those who govern us. In this case political parties from a variety of sides of the political spectrum are united around the need for as many as possible to get vaccinated. And they are strongly supported by the vast majority of people working in the medical and scientific sectors.

I urge you to consider these 2 elements of biblical faith very carefully in your decision making.

I have made my choice - for the sake of my neighbours (children, grandchildren, parishioners, golf club members, people I pass in the supermarket, people with underlying conditions or who need hospital beds for non-COVID related issues) I have taken seriously the advice of political leadership and I got vaccinated as soon as I could!

There is another biblical tenant that is so important at this time – the call to pray for our nation. I know that has been ongoing in the churches during this COVID season but it would be great for that to become a very concerted effort this week – a [SUPER SUNDAY – Let's Pray](#)

I have also found the latest statement of The Inter Church Bioethics Council helpful and have attached that for your consideration.
