## A summary of advertising in January.

#### **Christmas services**

#### Facebook

The Parish has four active Facebook pages: Kapiti Uniting Parish, Thrifty Place, Raumati Village Community Garden and Tiny Tunes at Raumati Uniting Church.

Here are a few recent highlights:

#### **Thrifty Place**

Our Thrifty Place Facebook page has helped increase our customer base at Thrifty Place.

Figures from the last 28 days include:

- Six posts have been posted advertising our hours and products on display.
- 985 views of posts (The number of times content was played or displayed. Content includes videos, posts, stories and ads.)

#### **Kapiti Uniting Parish**

In November we advertised the Carols and Cake event. We spent \$29.96 on a Facebook advertisement and received 2,596 views of the advertisement. We also advertised the Children's Christmas Carol service and received 3,935 views for a cost of \$30.

#### **Market Day**

Advertising is currently underway for our upcoming Market Day. Two billboards have been purchased and approximately 100 flyers of various sizes have been printed ready for distribution and display. Advertising will also be on our Facebook pages, website, Together magazine, notices and community radio.

A PowerPoint presentation has been refreshed for this year's event, with 63 slides displaying posters about the Parish and photos of our Parish. The PowerPoint will replay itself during the event in the Church. A poster displaying our Easter service times will also be included.



Carpeted shrubberies look a bit odd, and it was obvious that wood chips were required. Composting Services in Otaihanga Road charge \$50 to deliver a load, but lend trailers for free. But who in the church had a tow bar? Ralph and Lyn Martin's son Kevin not only gave his time and driving skills, but also insisted on paying for both trailer loads.

By this time Ernesto was back in town. Although he now has a darling little grand-daughter, he was still willing to help us in the garden. Elizabeth (Liz Sutherland) is on holiday just now, so it was great to have Ernesto's and Robin's help, as well as Kevin's and Ralph's. Many, many thanks to the wonderful workers and the generous giver!

There were more than enough wood chips for the carpeted garden, so I am now laying carpet in the garden between the car park and Thrifty Place. But I won't have enough carpet, so if anyone is replacing a woollen carpet, please ask the carpet layers to leave some of the old stuff for us.

In the meantime Ernesto is continuing to do great things with our grounds. Enjoy!

# **Bible Study**



This Lent, the Guest Leader of our Bible Study is Sister Catherine Jones, Tangata Tiriti.

Catherine has worked in Samoa, Algeria, France and Aotearoa in a variety of social justice and teaching roles – in addition to interfaith networking and ecumenical development.

Catherine uses an Ignatian method of study described as: 'Imaginative Contemplation'. She introduces the Gospel reading for the coming Sunday and asks the question, '*What is Jesus like in this passage*?'

Catherine offers us a reflective and refreshing way to engage with the Bible on our journey to the cross and the empty tomb. She has taught in Seminaries as well as churches using this method.
